Domestic violence (DV) is a serious international, national, and local social problem that impacts significantly on public health with the financial cost of DV in Australia estimated at-\$22billion. Dentists are uniquely positioned to identify patients who experience DV because they routinely assess the head and neck, where signs of physical trauma are often visible, and because they frequently encounter commensumble manifestations of DV such as anxiedepressionand triggered trauma. Due to the individual nature of dental appointments, dentists are also positioned to initiate dialogue in a confidential space, away from a violent partner. However, published eviden dealth feedback from professional peers indicates that little emphasis is placed on DV education for Australian undergraduate dental students.
